Staff assist with housing navigation, eviction prevention, benefits, and connections to care, while also supporting daily living skills. 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ISBH - Ground Works	\$94,191.76	\$18,620.00	Groundwork Residences provides safe, structured Level II recovery housing for women in Vinton County recovering from substance use disorders, including those with co-occurring mental health needs, justice involvement, or child welfare involvement. The program serves women with up to two children under age 12, as space allows. Residents live in a substance-free environment and participate in treatment, recovery activities, and regular drug screening. Services include case management, peer support, relapse prevention, parenting education, financial planning, and life skills development. ISBH - Community Transition Program	\$75,000.00	\$30,000.00	The Community Transition Program (CTP) supports adults returning to Athens, Hocking, and Vinton counties after prison incarceration with mental health and substance use treatment. Over 6–12 months, staff provide intensive, step-by-step support to build stability in housing, recovery, employment, and daily living. Services include housing placement, treatment linkage, medication support, crisis planning, job readiness, and life skills. JWCH - Recovery House	\$130,808.00	\$40,305.00	The John Clem Recovery House is a 10-bed, Level 3 residence that provides structured, recovery-focused housing for adult men (18+) with substance use disorders. Using a 12-step model, it supports recovery, mental health stability, relapse prevention, housing stability, and community reintegration in a safe, peer-supported, substance-free setting. Staff include an Executive Director, House Manager, and part-time Social Worker. 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LHSD - Prevention	\$55,000.00	\$55,000.00	The Logan-Hocking Student Wellness and Prevention Program provides school-based prevention services for K–12 students facing rising anxiety, depression, trauma exposure, vaping, and limited access to behavioral health care. Using a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS), the program delivers universal social-emotional learning, targeted small groups, and individualized support with referral to community providers as needed. A multidisciplinary school team and community partners ensure coordinated care.
